

Volunteer Role Description.

Maths Tutor:

As a volunteer Maths Tutor, you will have the opportunity to:

- Make a real difference in supporting and empowering vulnerable unaccompanied young refugees people from a range of backgrounds to have increased confidence and self-esteem enabling them to reach their full potential.
- Make the most of your existing skills and learn some new ones. You will receive the same training and development as our staff members.
- Be part of an amazing team committed to supporting and empowering young refugees.
- Volunteer expenses. HRSG reimburses volunteers travel costs and subsidises lunch for those working a full day.

About the role:

- To facilitate Maths lessons for young unaccompanied refugees/asylum seekers aged 16-21.
- To develop their capacity to enable them to communicate and engage more confidently. The content of lessons varies depending on the level of the young person's Maths.
- The aim of each lesson is to promote confidence and competence with numbers and the number system; develop the ability to solve problems through decision-making and reasoning in a range of contexts; develop a practical understanding of the ways in which information is gathered and presented; understand the importance of mathematics in everyday life; and its links with other areas of the curriculum; promote enjoyment and enthusiasm for learning through practical activity, exploration and discussion.
- Tutors to work with young people, to help significantly improve their Maths enhancing their chances of going on to further education, employment or training.

When Required:

Between Mondays to Fridays; 12.00 – 6pm

Commitment:

2 hours weekly. Minimum six month commitment.

Types of Activity:

Typical tasks that may be carried out include but not limited to:

- Planning, preparing and delivering lessons/ support to a range of young people aged 16-21.
- Preparing and setting tests, and exercises.
- Marking and providing appropriate feedback on oral and written work.
- Devising, writing and producing new materials, including audio and visual resources;
- Attending and contributing to training sessions.
- Teaching on a one-to-one basis
- Teaching on a group basis
- Basic administration, such as keeping accurate student registers and attendance records

Skills:

- Ability to work as part of a team
- Ability to work on own initiative
- Ability to keep information confidential
- Good at listening and communication skills
- Ability to work sensitively with others and show empathy
- Ability to uphold and to work within the organisation's Equal Opportunities Policy
- Willing to give consent for an Enhanced Criminal Records Bureau Check
- An understanding of the issues affecting unaccompanied refugees and asylum seekers

Personal attributes and attitudes:

Volunteer Tutors should:

- Like young people
- Be good listeners
- Have effective communication skills
- Be both professional and passionate
- Be tolerant of the views and opinions of others but not be afraid to offer positive challenge

Tutors should have a commitment to:

- Pursuing the best interests of young people
- The value of formal and informal education
- Equal opportunities and anti-discriminatory practice

Additional/Specific Suitability's:

The tutor should have the drive and the patience to work with young unaccompanied refugees and asylum seekers, to improve their skills whilst adhering to the project aims.
